Working as a Psychiatrist in New Zealand

Our population represents a diverse ethnic background and requires sensitivity to and understanding of Maori, Pasifika, Asian and other peoples' customs and needs. The ability to collaborate with whanau (family) during treatment is an important aspect of mental health treatment in New Zealand. Teams often include a clinical psychologist, registered nurse, social worker, occupational therapist and related support staff who work in a multi-disciplinary, collaborative environment. An open and accepting attitude towards one's team members is important. Valuing the strengths and perspectives of your team will go a long way towards establishing your credibility and earning the respect of your team. Liaising closely with your team members will help you learn some of the subtleties of our culture while ensuring that you come up with the most appropriate diagnoses and treatments for your clients.

Positions

Our need for board certified Psychiatrists in New Zealand in our public health care service exceeds our supply. Therefore, New Zealand needs to recruit Psychiatrists from overseas to fill some of our vacancies. As we are a small country Psychiatrists who are generalists by nature may be asked to be responsible for various aspects of general adult Psychiatry, both community and inpatient, which can include addictions, older persons and sometimes child and adolescents. The exact range of clinical responsibilities is usually negotiable with respect to your experience, interests, background, training and the services' needs.

Benefits for You

Length of Positions

Typically, for permanent, direct hire positions the doctor is bonded for two years for the cost of relocation assistance. If you were to leave before the two years are up you may be required to repay some or all of the costs of the relocation assistance provided to you. Therefore, for permanent, direct hire vacancies, a minimum two years' commitment is something you may want to consider. Shorter term positions are typically locums or on a fixed-term agreement of up to 12 months.



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
