



Hot Job Market for Radiologists

The job market for Radiologists right now in Canada is red hot. Are you currently board certified in Radiology by the American Board of Radiology, theabr.org? Do you have at least two years post board certification experience in Canada? Do you hold Canadian citizenship or landed immigrant status? Are you open to living and working in beautiful Alberta which offers a number of attractive outdoor and lifestyle opportunities?

Working as a Radiologist in Canada

Most positions are 35 hours a week with some employers offering part-time roles as well as the potential to invest into and become an active shareholder of privately held clinics. Most positions have no on-call duties.

Some positions have the potential to earn up to CAD\$600,000.

What employers typically look for may include, but not be limited to:

- · Ability to commit three years;
- Willing to work at least 38 weeks out of the year;
- Proficient in both adult and basic pediatric radiography, including adult GI fluoroscopy;
- Competent in general body, obstetrical, vascular, MSK and breast ultrasounds;
- Skilled in demonstrating an aptitude for basic image guided MSK and spinal procedures to manage pain under both fluoroscopy and ultrasound;
- Experienced in breast imaging and intervention techniques including tomosynthesis and ultrasound guided biopsies;
- Open to learning how to perform DEXA BMD;
- Comfortable working in a clinical setting caring for patients that includes gathering their history, performing physical exams, counselling;
- Prepared to address women's health issues;
- Ready to provide emergency care to unwell patients; and
- Keen on building colleagial relationships with other radiologists, staff, referring physicians and patients.

Registration Requirements

Besides being currently certified by the American Board of Radiology it is expected that the successful Physician will also be a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in Diagnostic Radiology.

It is expected that your training will have included all or most of the following:

- a) Patient care and safety;
- b) Report writing;
- c) Key conditions in early training;
- d) Applied imaging technology;
- e) Radiological anatomy and normal variants;
- f) Pathology;
- g) Abdominal imaging;
- h) Chest imaging;
- Neuro imaging;
- j) Head and neck imaging;
- k) Musculoskeletal imaging;
- Paediatric imaging;
- m) Breast imaging;
- n) Obstetric and gynaecological imaging; and
- o) Vascular imaging and intervention.

Your non-medical training will hopefully have included the following:

- 1) Team work;
- 2) Communication skills;
- 3) Patient support and advocacy;
- 4) Management and administrative skills;
- 5) Professionalism; and
- 6) Research and education.

Most full-time Radiologists who are part of a privately held practice in Canada are eligible for up to 14 weeks' paid vacation plus up to nine paid public holidays. Continuing Medical Education support and allowances tend to be negotiated on a case-by-case basis.

Perhaps one of the top benefits of living and working in Canada are the friendly people with Canada frequently ranked as a highly desirable place to live.

A partial reimbursement of malpractice insurance is often negotiated as part of the package.
